

COVID-19 - resources for parents and carers

At RCPCH we understand this is a worrying time for children and their families. Below are some useful resources from across the UK.

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To get an email notification of each update, you can <u>log in</u> and select the pink button in the grey box 'Notify me when updated'. We've listed our updates at the bottom of this page.

Key messages

COVID-19 is an illness that can affect your lungs and airways. It's caused by a virus called coronavirus.

It is important that we **all** follow official guidance and information provided by the governments and health agencies so we can protect our families and other people who may become seriously ill if they are infected with COVID-19.

- Up to date information about how to **stay safe and stop the spread** of coronavirus is available for England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.
- If you have <u>symptoms of COVID-19</u> (high temperature, a new continuous cough or a loss of, or change to, your sense of smell or taste) follow the advice for <u>England</u>, <u>Scotland</u>, <u>Wales</u> and <u>Northern Ireland</u>.
- Testing and contact tracing is available in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.
- Regularly **wash your hands** for at least 20 seconds (<u>here's a handy video</u>), and if you cannot wash your hands use hand sanitiser.
- If your child has a medical condition or injury they should continue to access treatment and attend medical appointments as recommended by their hospital, GP or healthcare professionals. We have added a poster to explain how to access help during this time - see below for both English and Welsh language versions. (You can also download the posters below.
- Some children and young people will be clinically extremely vulnerable to COVID-19. Up to date guidance on 'shielding' is available for <u>England</u>, <u>Scotland</u>, <u>Wales</u> and <u>Northern Ireland</u>.

COVID-19 linked syndrome

Most children and teenagers do **not** become seriously ill with COVID-19. But doctors have seen a very small number of patients with an unusual condition which seems to be linked to the virus.

Paediatric Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome temporally associated with COVID-19 (called PIMS-TS or PIMS for short) is very rare, and most children will not be seriously affected.

We've looked at the current evidence and worked with doctors to write a guide for parents, carers, teachers and others who look after children and young people.

Visiting hospital

 If your child is in hospital or has a hospital appointment there is advice from <u>NHS</u> <u>England</u> and the <u>Department of Health in Northern Ireland</u> about visiting. More advice will be available from your child's hospital ward or department.

Staying safe advice from UK Governments

England

• The government has <u>up to date guidance about COVID-19</u>. This includes <u>information</u> <u>on local alert levels</u>. They also have advice on <u>meeting with others safely</u> and <u>face</u> <u>coverings</u>.

- The <u>NHS COVID-19 app</u> is available to download in England and Wales.
- If you or a member of your household have the symptoms of COVID-19 follow advice from <u>Public Health England</u>. This includes information on how to get <u>tested and contact</u> tracing. There is also guidance for households with grandparents, parents and children living together.
- The Department of Health and Social Care has provided further information on when you should book a coronavirus test for your child.
- To check if you have coronavirus symptoms and for advice on what to do if you have go to <u>NHS 111 online</u>.
- There is guidance from Public Health England for <u>everyone</u> and for <u>young people</u> on shielding people most likely to get unwell if they catch coronavirus.

Scotland

- NHS Inform has advice for the public on their <u>website</u>, including <u>guidance for</u> <u>households with possible coronavirus infection</u>, information on how to get <u>tested</u> and <u>contact tracing</u>. There is also guidance on <u>physical distancing</u>, <u>protecting people who</u> <u>are most at risk of COVID-19</u> and <u>face coverings</u>.
- The Protect Scotland app is free to download from NHS Scotland's Test and Protect service.
- The <u>NHS 24 website</u> has guidance about when to call the NHS 111 service.

Wales

- The most up-to-date information provided by the Welsh Government is available on their <u>website</u> including guidance on <u>what you can and can't do during the outbreak</u>, <u>guidance for households with possible coronavirus</u> and <u>how to get tested</u>. There is also guidance on protecting those who are most at risk of COVID-19 and face coverings.
- The NHS COVID-19 app is available to download in England and Wales.
- Public Health Wales (PHW) also has guidance on COVID-19.
- NHS Direct Wales 111 has a helpful <u>online self-assessment guide</u> you can click through to let you know when they should be telephoning their helpline.

Northern Ireland

- The Public Health Agency (PHA) has useful information which can be found on their <u>website</u>. This includes advice on <u>preventing the spread of COVID-19</u>, <u>face coverings</u>, <u>testing</u> and <u>contact tracing</u>.
- There is also information on <u>nidirect</u> including advice of <u>staying at home and self-</u> isolation.

- <u>The Mix</u> provides a free confidential <u>helpline</u>, <u>crisis text line</u> and online service for under 25s that aims to find young people the best help, whatever the problem.

For parents and carers

- <u>Young Minds</u> has a <u>Parents' and Carers' Helpline</u> if you are worried about a child or young person's behaviour or mental health.
- <u>Contact</u> run a free <u>helpline</u> for parents and carers in the UK with a disabled child aged from birth to 25 who want to talk through their issues with an expert adviser.
