- Or is it more accurate to think of what it says at the gates of Dachau that those who forget the past are condemned to repeat it?
- Studying History will help you make sense of modern day events in Britain, in Ireland, in Europe and the world



History and your future

Maybe you won't need to know about the Long Parliament, or the Night of Long Knives to get a successful career. But the skills you gain from History are applicable to a wide range of professions



History and your future

Historians can reason and argue. Historians examine and evaluate evidence. Historians present a case based on their evidence. Historians can argue a case, but understand and respect the views of others.



So do people in a range of professions, from lawyers to politicians to journalists

What will you study?

History has a huge range of options, but...

- Like the GCSE you are doing, History has to cover a roughly even mixture of British and non British history
- It also has to cover a range of at least 200 years overall, which means that we have to cover at least one period of History from before the 19th or 20th centuries. So...

- The Early Stuarts and the Civil War 1603 1660 (Y108)

 The most explosive period in British History rebellion and revolution, the bloody Civil War and its republican aftermath, muskets at Edgehill, axes in Whitehall, the imitation of Christ on the rutted road into Bristol...
- Democracy & Dictatorships in Germany 1919-1963 (Y221)
 The Nazi dictatorship why did it happen? What impact did it make? What were the consequences?
- Britain & Ireland 1791 1921 (Y316) The relationship between Britain and its "half alien dependency". Rebellion from Wolfe Tone to the Easter Rising, reform from the Act of Union to Home Rule, the era of O'Connell, Gladstone and Parnell
- Coursework on USSR 1917 to 1991 (Y100) The rise and fall of Soviet Communism – questions can vary from the rise of Lenin to the fall of Gorbachev, from the 5 Year Plans to glasnost and perestroika, from the role of women to the misery of the peasants.

Assessment

- The Britain exam is worth 25%, Germany 15%, Ireland 40%, and the NEA (coursework) 20%
- Assessment will mostly be through essay questions the Britain paper includes one question based on sources, and the Ireland paper one question based on two extracts from historians
- The NEA is between 3,500 and 4,000 words (trust me, you will struggle to write that little!)



The European part in Year 12

▶ Will be on Germany 1919 to 1963 – Nazi Germany, and the governments either side of it. The causes, course and consequences of Nazism for Germany and its impact on the world. How did Hitler come to power? Did all Germans agree with him? Why did Nazi Germany commit such terrible crimes, and with what results?


Some of the greatest set pieces in British history

- The King striding into the Commons to find his birds have flown
- "Edgehill fight" families rent apart as Englishman takes arms against Englishman
- The anointed King on trial for his life
- The greatest political debate in British history
- ► Then this is the period of History for you!

Year 13

- ➤ A depth study on Ireland from 1791 to 1921 from Wolfe Tone's Rebellion to independence and partition
- Issues that still divide the Island of Ireland today and resonate with many of our students







NEA (Coursework)

- Is on Russia / the USSR in the twentieth century.
 There are a range of questions, so every student should study the overall period, but then focus on their own individual task
- Tasks range from how the Bolsheviks won power to the rise of Stalin, to the fall of Gorbachev and the collapse of the USSR itself
- Students have in recent years looked at the role of women, the impact of the 5 Year Plans or Collectivisation, and why the Soviets defeated the Nazis



Resources and Opportunities

- Each student has an individual textbook for each part of the course
- There are already a range of resources for each part of the course in the two history rooms, and this is developed further every year
- We have often attended conferences at Carrs Lane in Birmingham



History A level – a record of success

- In the three years after this exam was introduced from 2017, 48 students sat the new A Level in History all of them passed and 37 (77%) with at least a Grade C
- In 2019, we were particularly successful, with 2 A* grades, 4 A grades and 6 B grades from our 21 students
- In 2022/23, from 30 candidates, all again passed, with 26 gaining at least a C grade, and four A* or A grades.
- So in five examination years from 2017, 78 students have sat History A Level, with 63 (81%) getting at least a Grade C, and 11 (14%) an A or A* grade.



And going on to University

- Members of recent History A level groups have studied History at Universities including Durham, Manchester, Liverpool, Exeter, Nottingham and Lancaster
- Two of our previous History students got First Class degrees in 2015 at Hull and Sheffield, and two other past students were awarded distinctions in Masters at Medieval History at Oxford. Two of those have now completed Ph.Ds
- One of our former students got a First at Durham in History in 2022, and another achieved a prize winning First at Exeter in 2023 (see the display board in the corridor)
