

Entry Requirements

- •Entrance into Sixth Form is based upon achieving an average points score of **5.0** in five subjects.
- A good standard of English as this subject involves **a lot of writing**! With extended writing answers ranging from 20-40 mark questions.
- •If you have a **GCSE** in **Sociology** you would also need a **grade 5** or above to take the subject.
- You do not need a GCSE in sociology to take the A level. If you do have one and are keen to continue it, it will have some similar topics, keywords, theories and methods, however, you will be studying it more depth and develop an understanding of a bigger range of sociologists.



Pupil:
